

# **Writing Grant**

## Overview

Students wishing to apply for the Morningside University English & Rhetoric Writing Grant will submit a 2-5 page piece of writing that is either creative (a series of poems, a short piece of fiction, a short piece of nonfiction) or academic (an argumentative essay). Students who earn that grant will show some or all of the following:

## **Creative Submissions**

- Thoughtful use of figurative language
- Concrete & vivid language
- Intentional rhyme & meter
- Developed plot & narrative
- Attention to editing detail (limited or no mechanical/grammatical errors)

## **Academic Submissions**

- Clearly stated major claim
- Well supported using integrated credible sources
- Concrete & vivid language
- Well designed structure
- Attention to editing detail (limited or no mechanical/grammatical errors)

# Writing Grant Recipients

You will be expected to do two of the following each year to keep your financial award:

- Attend at least one Writing Day event
- Participate in Kiosk or The Morningside Review
- Take at least one Creative Writing, Rhetoric, or English class

## Writing Day Events

These are monthly events that promote writing on campus. They may include attending a campus speaking event, participating in an activity (like "Positive Post-Its"), and so on.

## Kiosk / The Morningside Review

These are two campus publications that are created and edited by students. *Kiosk* is the literary & arts magazine (print), and *The Morningside Review* is an academic journal (online).

#### Creative Writing, Rhetoric, & English Classes

There are a variety of classes offered each semester that fulfill general education requirements (like Fine & Communicative Arts, Humanities, Ethical Reasoning, and Civic Responsibility). Taking more than one could also lead to a minor in Creative Writing, Professional Writing, or English Literature.
